1. Executive Summary

- a) **Executive Summary:** MIDAP's main objective is to generate scientific knowledge based on a multidimensional understanding of depression in interaction with personality, and to maximize the effectiveness of interventions in prevention, psychotherapy, and rehabilitation. In its seventh year of operation, MIDAP's scientific team includes over 220 researchers, students, collaborators, and technicians who belong to its six host institutions as well as to other Chilean and foreign institutions. We summarize the scientific activity of MIDAP that was organized around four basic lines of research.

L1: Basic structures and bio-psycho-social processes. Scientific activity within L1 during 2021 focused on biological mechanisms, social determinants of mental health and instrument validation studies. An additional area of research within this line pertains focused COVID-10 and mental health research across different age groups and using different designs, including cross-sectional surveys, representative samples, and intensive longitudinal designs.

L2: Health promotion and psychosocial prevention. During 2021, an emphasis on internet-based interventions continues to be present which presents with significant benefits in terms of coverage and dissemination. A focus on parenting as related to socioemotional development and mental health outcomes may provide additional pathways for preventive and promotional interventions. The merits of video-feedback and mentalization-informed interventions have been evaluated as feasible and effective strategies to strengthen socioemotional development in preschool children and toddlers.

L3: Psychotherapeutic interventions and change processes. During 2021, a focus on micro processes of discourse-voice regulation, provides a broad set of projects which have supplied findings that contribute significantly to understand mechanisms involved in psychotherapeutic change. New findings have emerged from the study of psychotherapy for children's survivors of sexual abuse. Research on psychotherapy for LGBTQ+ populations continue to deepen as other studies that have been developing over the years have supplied results. Research on psychotherapeutic interventions in public health care settings has strengthen, including primary as well as tertiary health care services.

L4.: Mitigation of Chronicity in the Course of Depression. Focus on chronicity and recovery continued to be developed within L4. Current focus of this research line involves the role of early adverse experiences and childhood abuse and maltreatment on mental health outcomes and the role of chronic health conditions on treatment response to anti-depressive interventions as well as treatment adaptations and innovations to optimize treatment results for this group of patients.

Productivity: During 2021, 109 scientific documents were published, more than any previous year. Publications include 103 articles, and six other scientific publication, including special bulletins, policy papers, reports, and treatment guidelines. Seventy (68%) of scientific papers were published in journals indexed in Web of Science/SCOPUS where 30 (43%) were published in quartile 1 (Q1) and 19 (27%) in quartile 2 (Q2) journals. 42 involved Young Researchers or Postdoctoral Researchers as co-authors and 30 included student participation. During 2021, the first of MIDAP books published by Springer was published *Depression and personality dysfunction: Towards the understanding of complex depression*. 104 presentations were delivered, which signals an 85% increase from last year. Of these presentations, 80% of them were delivered physically or virtually in international venues.

Education, Training and Capacity Building. As to late 2021, MIDAP has received 206 young trainees (30 undergraduate students, 80 master's students, 83 doctoral students, and 13 Postdoctoral Researchers [PR]), not to mention the many research assistants that have worked at the institute. Twenty-two Young Researchers (YR) have been part of MIDAP during these years. During 2021, 51 doctoral students, 36 master's students, and 13 undergraduate students were part of MIDAP, coming from different universities and programs. 16 YRs were part of MIDAP during 2021, 63% of whom received fees for their work in studies conducted within MIDAP. They were able to apply for partial grants to support conference attendance and thus to present results in national and international contexts

and establish collaboration networks. Twenty MIDAP students successfully completed their theses: seven doctoral students and 13 master's students. Furthermore, 7 other students obtained their bachelor's degree in psychology.

Networking. During 2020, MIDAP continues to consolidate its international footprint, maintaining and strengthening many of its international networks, even though international travel remained difficult due to the COVID-19 pandemic. International (and national) research networks were developed and/or further consolidated on MIDAP's traditional topics

Outreach and Connections. Due to the difficulties for face-to-face activities due to the Covid-19 epidemic, we added new communication products, improved our website, and increased our activity in social networks. We generated a podcast "Salud Mental al día", transmitted by Spotify, with a monthly frequency. Through the Mailchimp platform, we disseminate the "MIDAP Newsletter" to more than 6,000 contacts monthly. We maintained the partnership with the online media "CIPER Académico" for scientific dissemination in which we produced 11 publications. The successful campaign "¡Cuida tu Salud Mental!" was launched by the digital platforms of Metro de Santiago. We also participated in the Science Festival "Puerto de Ideas". We produced an animated video on the topic of grief in pandemics and researchers participated in many programs on television and radio. In all other aspects, we preserved most of the connections established in previous years. For the first time, MIDAP was formally invited as an institution to form part of the technical committee of experts in Mental Health for the elaboration of the National Health Plan 2021-2030. At present, MIDAP has 1,792 followers on Twitter, 11,630 on Facebook, 3,976 on Instagram and 215 followers on LinkedIn.

Administration and Financial Status. Due to the COVID health emergency, all the administrative tasks of the MIDAP Institute have been conducted remotely, and the weekly meetings of the management team continued. The board of associate researchers increased by 4 new members, formerly adjunct researchers. The Institute received the total payment from the MSI by early July 2021 (approx. US\$378,000), the same amount in Chilean pesos as the previous year, a 9% smaller dollar amount relative to 2020. Additionally, the MSI contributed with US\$ 16,800 for Outreach activities, a 18% budget increase compared with the funding allocated in 2020. MIDAP continues to receive financial support from ANID (approximately US\$ 20,900), allocated through FONDECYT for research projects conducted by MIDAP researchers, together with other grants obtained from various sources. We received a grant of US\$14,380 from the Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile to support the training of postdoctoral researchers and a payment of US\$ 20,500 for a scientific consultancy to an external enterprise, and received an additional US\$ 63,400 from the training programs offered annually by MIDAP. The outflow structure for the year 2021 followed the same pattern of past years, with most of the MSI income being spent on researchers' and students' salaries and bonuses, internal research grants, and a rather small contribution for attending scientific events.

b) Resumen Ejecutivo

El objetivo principal de MIDAP es generar conocimiento científico basado en una comprensión multidimensional de la depresión en interacción con la personalidad, y maximizar la eficacia de las intervenciones en prevención, psicoterapia y rehabilitación. En su séptimo año de funcionamiento, el equipo científico de MIDAP cuenta con más de 220 investigadores, estudiantes, colaboradores y técnicos que pertenecen a sus seis instituciones anfitrionas, así como a otras instituciones chilenas y extranjeras. Resumimos la actividad científica del MIDAP que se ha organizado en torno a cuatro líneas básicas de investigación.

L1: Estructuras básicas y procesos biopsicosociales. Durante el año 2021, se sigue haciendo hincapié en las intervenciones basadas en Internet, lo que presenta importantes ventajas en términos de cobertura y difusión. Un enfoque en la crianza de los hijos en relación con el desarrollo socioemocional y los resultados de la salud mental puede proporcionar vías adicionales para las intervenciones preventivas y promocionales. Se han evaluado las ventajas de las intervenciones basadas en la video-retroalimentación y la mentalización como estrategias factibles y eficaces para fortalecer el desarrollo socioemocional en niños preescolares y niños pequeños.

L2: Promoción de la salud y prevención psicosocial. Durante el año 2021, se sigue haciendo hincapié en las intervenciones basadas en Internet, lo que presenta importantes ventajas en términos de cobertura y difusión. Un enfoque en la crianza de los hijos en relación con el desarrollo socioemocional y los resultados de la salud mental puede proporcionar vías adicionales para las intervenciones preventivas y promocionales. Se han evaluado las ventajas de las intervenciones basadas en la video-retroalimentación y la mentalización como estrategias factibles y eficaces para fortalecer el desarrollo socioemocional en niños preescolares y niños pequeños.

L3: Intervenciones psicoterapéuticas y procesos de cambio. Durante el año 2021, un enfoque en los microprocesos de regulación del discurso-voz, proporciona un amplio conjunto de proyectos que han suministrado hallazgos que contribuyen significativamente a entender los mecanismos involucrados en el cambio psicoterapéutico. Han surgido nuevos hallazgos en el estudio de la psicoterapia para niños supervivientes de abusos sexuales. La investigación sobre la psicoterapia para poblaciones LGBTQ+ se sigue profundizando a medida que otros estudios que se han ido desarrollando a lo largo de los años han aportado resultados. Se ha reforzado la investigación sobre las intervenciones psicoterapéuticas en los entornos de atención sanitaria pública, tanto en los servicios de atención primaria como en los terciarios.

L4: Mitigación de la Cronicidad en el Curso de la Depresión. El enfoque en la cronicidad y la recuperación continuó desarrollándose dentro de la L4. Esta línea de investigación se centra actualmente en el papel de las experiencias adversas tempranas y el abuso y maltrato en la infancia en los resultados de salud mental y el papel de las condiciones de salud crónicas en la respuesta al tratamiento de las intervenciones antidepresivas, así como las adaptaciones e innovaciones del tratamiento para optimizar los resultados del tratamiento para este grupo de pacientes.

Productividad: En 2021 se publicaron 109 documentos científicos, más que en cualquier año anterior. Las publicaciones incluyen 103 artículos y otras seis publicaciones científicas, como boletines especiales, documentos de política, informes y directrices de tratamiento. Setenta (68%) de los documentos científicos se publicaron en revistas indexadas en Web of Science/SCOPUS, donde 30 (43%) se publicaron en el cuartil 1 (Q1) y 19 (27%) en el cuartil 2 (Q2). En 42 participaron jóvenes investigadores o investigadores postdoctorales como coautores y en 30 participaron estudiantes. Durante 2021 se publicó el primero de los libros del MIDAP publicados por Springer *Depression and personality dysfunction: Towards the understanding of complex depression*. Se realizaron 104 presentaciones, lo que supone un aumento del 85% respecto al año pasado. De estas presentaciones, el 80% se realizaron física o virtualmente en lugares internacionales

Educación, formación y capacitación. Hasta finales de 2021, el MIDAP ha recibido a 206 jóvenes en prácticas (30 estudiantes de grado, 80 de máster, 83 de doctorado y 13 investigadores posdoctorales [PR]), sin contar con los numerosos asistentes de investigación que han trabajado en el instituto. Veintidós jóvenes investigadores (YR) han formado parte del MIDAP durante estos años. Durante 2021, 51 estudiantes de doctorado, 36 de máster y 13 de grado formaron parte del MIDAP, procedentes de diferentes universidades y programas. 16 YRs formaron parte del MIDAP durante 2021, de los cuales el 63% recibieron honorarios por sus trabajos en estudios realizados dentro del MIDAP. Pudieron solicitar becas parciales para apoyar la asistencia a congresos y así presentar resultados en contextos nacionales e internacionales y establecer redes de colaboración. Veinte estudiantes de MIDAP terminaron con éxito sus tesis: siete estudiantes de doctorado y 13 de magister. Además, otros 7 estudiantes obtuvieron su licenciatura en psicología.

Redes. Durante 2020, el MIDAP sigue consolidando su huella internacional, manteniendo y reforzando muchas de sus redes internacionales, aunque los viajes internacionales siguieron siendo difíciles debido a la pandemia de COVID-19. Se desarrollaron y/o consolidaron las redes de investigación internacionales (y nacionales) sobre los temas tradicionales del MIDAP.

Divulgación y conexiones. Debido a las dificultades para las actividades presenciales por la epidemia de Covid-19, incorporamos nuevos productos de comunicación, mejoramos nuestra página web y aumentamos nuestra actividad en las redes sociales. Generamos un podcast "Salud Mental al día", transmitido por Spotify, con una periodicidad mensual. A través de la plataforma Mailchimp, difundimos el "Boletín MIDAP" a más de 6.000 contactos mensualmente. Mantuvimos la colaboración con el medio online "CIPER Académico" para la divulgación científica, en la que realizamos 11 publicaciones. Se lanzó la exitosa campaña "¡Cuida tu Salud Mental!" a través de las plataformas digitales del Metro de Santiago. También participamos en el Festival de la Ciencia "Puerto de Ideas". Produjimos un video animado sobre el tema del duelo en las pandemias y los investigadores participaron en numerosos programas de televisión y radio. En todos los demás aspectos, conservamos la mayoría de las conexiones establecidas en años anteriores. Por primera vez, el MIDAP fue invitado formalmente como institución a formar parte del comité técnico de expertos en Salud Mental para la elaboración del Plan Nacional de Salud 2021-2030. En la actualidad, el MIDAP cuenta con 1.792 seguidores en Twitter, 11.630 en Facebook, 3.976 en Instagram y 215 seguidores en LinkedIn.

Situación administrativa y financiera. Debido a la emergencia sanitaria de COVID, todas las tareas administrativas del Instituto MIDAP siguieron desarrollándose a distancia, y han continuado las reuniones semanales del equipo directivo. El consejo de investigadores asociados se incrementó con 4 nuevos miembros, anteriormente investigadores adjuntos. El Instituto recibió el pago total de Milenio a principios de julio de 2021 (aprox. 378,000 dólares), la misma cantidad en pesos chilenos que el año anterior, pero un monto 9% menor en dólares en relación a 2020. Adicionalmente, Milenio contribuyó con US\$ 16,800 para actividades de difusión, un incremento presupuestario del 18% en comparación con el financiamiento asignado en 2020. MIDAP sigue recibiendo apoyo financiero de la ANID (aproximadamente US\$ 20,900), asignado a través de FONDECYT para proyectos de investigación realizados por investigadores de MIDAP, junto con otras subvenciones obtenidas de diversas fuentes. Recibimos una subvención de US\$ 14,380 de la UC para apoyar la formación de investigadores posdoctorales. Además de un pago de US\$ 20,500 por consultoría científica a una empresa externa, y recibimos otros US\$ 63,400 de los programas de capacitación que ofrece anualmente el MIDAP. La estructura de egresos para el año 2021 siguió el mismo patrón de los años pasados, con la mayor parte de los aportes de Milenio destinados a los incentivos y bonificaciones de los investigadores y estudiantes, a becas de investigación internas y a una contribución más bien pequeña para la asistencia a eventos científicos.

c) Outstanding Achievements

The year 2021 continued to be marked by two events that plunged Chile into a triple crisis: social, political, and public health, namely the social outbreak in October 2019 and the Covid-19 pandemic from March 2020.

This situation increased the levels of uncertainty and stress in the population and in all national institutions in a way never seen before. In the face of this situation, MIDAP's greatest achievement during 2021 was to continue to be able to adapt to new circumstances and to have explored new ways of fulfilling its mission. MIDAP was able to open up new possibilities to reach remote locations in the country and Latin America. In this process, MIDAP has continued to consolidate its position as a leading Mental Health research center in Chile and Latin America. In this regard, it is noteworthy that MIDAP has been formally invited as an institution to be part of the technical committee of experts in Mental Health for the elaboration of the National Health Plan 2021-2030.

In the scientific area, 109 papers were published in WoS or Scopus journals, the highest number ever achieved in a single year, as well as the publication of the first of a series of books in Springer. Also noteworthy is the participation and collaboration of several researchers in all publications.

Three scientific events were planned and executed during 2021. In November 2021, the III Latin-American Summer School for Research in Depression and Personality was organized by MIDAP; in December 2021 an International Seminar of Borderline Personality Disorder was organized; during May, 2021, psychotherapists from Latin America participated in an international seminar organized by MIDAP entitled "Psychotherapy during the pandemic: experiences and adaptations of Latin-American psychotherapists".

As in other years, some of our members received awards for their contribution to the advancement of our field and/or were called to positions of responsibility in university institutions.

Finally, this year we systematically increased our dissemination work through our partnership with CIPER/Académico, which publish several opinion columns, articles, and interviews on the hot mental health topics in the country and which had a high media impact. Besides, MIDAP created the program "Mental Health Updates - MIDAP's Podcast", which can be accessed on Spotify. One or more episodes are released each month. They are hosted by the head of the area of Communications, who holds a 40-minute interview with a researcher from the center or other relevant guests to talk about the studies and new findings associated with each of MIDAP's lines of research, prioritizing the most news-worthy topics at the time of the interview.

2. Introduction

- a) **Description of the Institute:** The Millennium Institute for Research in Depression and Personality (MIDAP) is a scientific center that hosts researchers from various fields of the social and health sciences. MIDAP's main objective is to generate scientific knowledge based on a multidimensional understanding of depression in interaction with personality. A particular aim of this research agenda is to maximize the effectiveness of interventions through the identification of the agents and mechanisms of change that participate in prevention, psychotherapy, and rehabilitation. In its seventh year of operation, MIDAP's scientific team includes over 220 researchers, students, collaborators, and technicians who belong to its six host institutions (Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile [UC], Universidad de Chile [UCh], Universidad de Desarrollo [UDD], Universidad de la Frontera [UFRO], Universidad de Valparaíso [UV]), and Universidad Diego Portales [UDP], as well as to other Chilean and foreign institutions.

MIDAP developed out of the “Psychotherapy and Change Research Group” and the “Psychological Intervention and Change in Depression” Millennium Nucleus. When establishing these scientific initiatives, a combination of psychological, psychosocial, and psychophysiological approaches to depression were examined and tested. This multidimensional approach to the study of depression is continued by MIDAP including, at the same time, a differentiated analysis of personality and all the relevant dimensions involved in depression and personality disorders.

MIDAP's characteristic multidimensional and multidisciplinary approach is aimed at constructing an empirical model that takes into account the etiology, prevention, intervention, and rehabilitation of depression. This approach addresses the relationship between depression and personality, along with the multiple dimensions of human functioning that have been empirically linked to this disorder. Thus, MIDAP aspires to conduct systematic research on each of these dimensions, which include developmental, cognitive, emotional, and behavioral variables as well as others of a psychophysiological and genetic nature. MIDAP pursues this multidimensional scientific agenda using a variety of methods and multiple research design and analytic strategies, including cross-sectional, longitudinal, experimental and naturalistic designs, process-and outcome-oriented studies, and quantitative and qualitative data-analytic strategies.

Like the previous year, 2021 was also challenging for MIDAP's operation. The worldwide COVID-19 pandemic began in 2020 and continued during 2021, with lockdown measures being implemented in Chile. This context made it necessary for MIDAP's scientific, training, and outreach activities to be conducted mostly on-line. New studies about mental health and the COVID-19 pandemic were carried out and MIDAP researchers had an extremely active role in the media, conveying evidence-based information about mental health care to the population. MIDAP researchers also played a significant and active role in high-stakes task forces organized by the government to address the social and health challenges faced by the country.

MIDAP's studies are organized within four distinct lines of research. Even though –much like 2020– 2021 was difficult for international travel and participation in scientific conferences, MIDAP's scientific output increased in comparison to previous years, likely because new young researchers joined the Institute and also because laboratory activities and other field work was halted, allowing for more time to write and submit scientific papers. MIDAP's scientific output continues to have a significant impact not only on scientific knowledge but also on the design and implementation of public policies intended to eliminate or mitigate the subjective and societal burden of depression, especially in the context of social unrest and the pandemic, which has compounded social injustice in Chile. Indeed, the integration of multidimensional components to understand the etiology, maintenance, and treatment of depression in its interaction with personality will contribute to improved and more efficacious algorithms for indication of viable and cost-effective interventions, taking into account social determinants of mental health.

In addition, the health context associated with COVID-19 during 2021 made it necessary to maintain the modifications to the working conditions of MIDAP's teams and ongoing studies that we implemented in

2020. Regular meetings were held regularly through virtual platforms, achieving high participation levels. Also, the number of studies that used telematics-based assessments and interventions increased. This allowed us to enhance the use of technology in our research, transforming the challenges generated by the pandemic into an opportunity to achieve our objectives.

b) **Lines of Research:** The scientific activity of MIDAP is organized around four basic lines of research, each of which includes a number of specific studies conducted by interdisciplinary teams of researchers from the fields of psychology, psychiatry, genetics, psychophysiology, neuroscience, anthropology, and sociology (specific studies are presented in chapter 3 of this report and Appendix I):

1. **Basic bio-psycho-social structures and processes.** This line of research focuses on the origins and mechanisms that trigger, develop, and maintain psychological disorders, focusing on depression and personality dysfunction. It involves the assessment of multiple cultural, social, developmental, and psychobiological conditions involved in depression and personality. During 2021, this line continued to provide evidence in support of MIDAP's multidimensional model, which regards depression as being nested within personality and receiving influences from cultural, biological, psychological, and genetic variables. The scientific activity in this line continued to uncover disease mechanisms, conducting basic psychological research, understanding risk factors, and adapting instrumentation for local use. Mental health and COVID-19 studies continued during 2021, with new publications and research using a variety of designs, including cross-sectional and longitudinal studies.
2. **Health promotion and psychosocial prevention.** This line of research focuses on evaluating the effectiveness of intervention strategies aimed at changing the early conditions associated with the development of depression and personality dysfunction. Scientific projects developed within this line seek to reduce the social exclusion of the psychologically handicapped and foster the capabilities of mental health professionals. During 2021, the studies in this line continued to provide good coverage of health promotion and prevention over the life span with increased scientific activities focusing on Internet-based interventions for prevention in mental health. Some studies were focused on parenting, socioemotional development, and mental health, providing additional pathways for preventive and promotional interventions. Video-feedback and mentalization-informed interventions have been examined and appear to be feasible and effective strategies to strengthen socioemotional development in preschoolers and toddlers.
3. **Psychotherapeutic interventions and change processes.** This line of research focuses on the analysis of change processes and the effectiveness of psychological interventions. Studies examining change mechanisms and mediation as well as the moderation components of psychological treatments characterize the scientific projects conducted within this line of research. During 2021, this line provided a broad set of projects that yielded findings that significantly improved our understanding of the mechanisms involved in psychotherapeutic change. New findings have emerged from the study of psychotherapy for child survivors of sexual abuse as well as from research on psychotherapy for LGBTQ+ populations. Also, research on psychotherapeutic interventions in public health care settings has been strengthened by including primary health care services as well as tertiary, specialized treatment settings such as hospitals.
4. **Mitigation of Chronicity in the Course of Depression (previously rehabilitation and reintegration).** This line of research focuses on understanding, preventing, and mitigating the chronicity of depression. This line of research is currently focused on the role of early adverse experiences and childhood abuse and maltreatment on mental health outcomes and the role of chronic health conditions on treatment response to anti-depressive interventions, while also examining treatment adaptations and innovations to optimize treatment results for this group of patients.

c. **Organization of research teams:** MIDAP is led by the Council of Associate Researchers, which holds monthly meetings. The tasks of the Council include: organizing and coordinating all the scientific-academic activities of the Institute; actively participating in the research conferences held each semester;

making decisions about the promotion of researchers belonging to the Institute; defining the rules of allocation of some internal resources and selecting their beneficiaries; and making strategic decisions about the research conducted at the Institute, among other tasks.

MIDAP is engaged in a constant evaluative and reflective process in preparation for the renewal stage that we will face in a couple of years. During this stage, our permanent policy of promoting younger MIDAP researchers continued. As part of this process, researcher Dr. Graciela Rojas voiced her wish to step down as Associate Researcher at MIDAP, a position that she has held since 2015. In view of her outstanding career and her historical role at MIDAP, she was invited to join MIDAP's Advisory Council of Senior Researchers, along with renowned foreign personalities such as Drs. Susanne Schlüter-Müller, Klaus Schmeck, Adam Horvath, and Peter Fonagy as well as leading Chilean researcher Guillermo de la Parra. Likewise, other two Council researchers were relieved of their duties as Associate Researchers for them to stay at MIDAP as Adjunct Researchers: Dr. Diego Cosmelli and Dr. Jaime Silva. These changes do not prevent them from meeting their scientific-academic obligations to MIDAP, since they continue to lead the studies that they are conducting within their lines of research at the Institute. Finally, in August 2021, we invited our Adjunct and Young Researchers residing in Chile to participate in a process for promotion to Associate Researchers, with a view to partially renewing MIDAP's Council. A total of 13 candidates applied, making the process highly competitive. After the evaluation, conducted by an ad hoc commission composed of two associate researchers and one senior researcher, the following researchers were promoted to MIDAP Institute Associates: Dr. Alex Behn, Dr. Paula Errázuriz, Dr. Carolina Altimir, and Dr. Paula Dagnino. All of them have been linked to MIDAP for a long time and were Adjunct Researchers before their promotion. Despite these changes, we maintained a consolidated group to successfully face the challenges of 2021 and achieve the goals proposed for this period and future.

All the studies conducted are associated with at least one of MIDAP's four lines of research. In many cases, the Study Director is an Associate Researcher. Increasingly though, as noted in the 2021 report, the study leader is an Adjunct, Young, or post-doctoral Researcher. This is a direct result of the Institute's efforts to foster the scientific development of early career researchers.

3. Scientific and technological research:

- a) **Current status of the lines of research:** The scientific objectives of MIDAP are: (a) To produce scientific knowledge about depression and personality based on a multidimensional perspective that integrates cultural, social, developmental, psychological, psycho-physical, and genetic aspects; (b) To examine specific age-related characteristics associated with depression and personality during pregnancy/nursing, infancy, adolescence, adulthood, and older adulthood; and (c) To generate knowledge that can nourish mental health policies for the development of improved prevention, therapy, and rehabilitation services.

In order to achieve these scientific goals, MIDAP develops four lines of research (see Annex 2). MIDAP's studies are executed within these lines of research based on different funding sources, including the Millennium Scientific Initiative (MSI) as well as other sources including Fondecyt, ANID, and international grants. Accordingly, MIDAP researchers are encouraged to apply for national and international grants, in order to sustain and/or continue their research.

The current chapter presents a summary of MIDAP's scientific activity during 2021. Organizing the information by line of research, we first present the scientific aim for each line summarily; then, we describe the main studies developed within each line of research during 2021, pointing out their progress during the reported period (for instance, indicating related productivity as well as other hallmarks of scientific output). Results are discussed in an integrative fashion, with attention to MIDAP's scientific goals. We conclude with the limitations and/or difficulties encountered.

- a.1 Line of Research 1 (L1): Basic structures and bio-psycho-social processes.** This line of research focuses on the origins and mechanisms that trigger, develop, and maintain psychological disorders, with a focus on depression and personality dysfunction. It is essential to keep in mind that MIDAP understands depression as a multi-causal, multi-level phenomenon. Thus, scientific efforts within L1 intend to evaluate all the cultural, social, developmental, and psychobiological conditions involved in depression and personality dysfunction. Ongoing studies developed within this line tackle the following research question: **Considering each specific level, how are genetic determinants, bio-markers, and psychological and interpersonal variables associated –and interact– with depressive symptomatology, clinical depression, personality dysfunction, suicidality and people's subjective well-being?**

L1 continue to strengthen and involves several ongoing and new research projects that have produced relevant scientific outputs. Studies developed within this line cover a broad range of scientific problems related to biological, psychological and social processes that have progressively reached very interesting and significant conclusions. Research focused on adapting measurement instruments for basic psychopathology dimensions are also included within this line of research. During 2021 the scientific activity in L1 continued to uncover disease mechanisms, conducting basic psychological research, understanding risk factors, and adapting instrumentation for local use. Within L1, mental health and COVI-19 studies continued during 2021, with new publications and new studies added to the line. These studies will be covered under the productivity of L1.

Study 001-L1 (The Psychopathology of Everyday-Life of Borderline Personality Disorder: Towards and Integrative Model of Disease Mechanisms). This study started recruiting participants during 2021 thanks to a grant from the P. Universidad Católica de Chile (INICIO) and from MIDAP continuity funds. The design involves an intensive Ecological Momentary Assessment Design to examine causal processes between basic areas of dysfunction in BPD. During 2021 study set-up was achieved and 100 health participants completed 7 days of intensive measurements and recruitment of BPD subjects was initiated. This study strengthens MIDAP's research of personality pathology using state of the art experience sampling methodologies which allow to capture moment to moment influences between psychopathology dimensions.

Study 006-L1 (Evaluation of differential mechanisms for the influence of information technologies in the development and maintenance of anxious and depressive symptoms). This study focuses on examining mechanisms that go individual use of information technologies (e.g. online surfing, or gaming) to adverse mental health outcomes. During 2021, four distinct data-bases were completed with a total of 3000 participants sampled overall including adolescents and adults. This study, currently developed with a ANID Fondecyt Grant (11201010) examines an important area of research that has recently attracted prominent attention, namely the interaction between internet use and affordances and adverse mental health outcomes. Several manuscripts were submitted for publication and have appeared in journals in 2022, so they will be reported in the 2022 report.

Study 015-L1 (Use of antidepressants during pregnancy: psychological causes and craniofacial consequences). This literature review study was conducted during 2021 and examines the relationship between serotonin levels in pregnant mothers diagnosed with depression and or taking SSRIs, and craniofacial features in babies. Mechanisms specifically related to progenitor cells are examined in detail in a publication (Publication #20). This study is an important contribution to the problem of treating depressed mothers during pregnancy taking into account costs and benefits and specific mechanisms that may impact babies in utero.

Study 016-L1 (Effects of perceived discrimination and unfair treatment on health, obesity and metabolic syndrome: psychological and physiological mechanisms in a longitudinal study). Also, along the lines of biological mechanisms this study is looking at the effects of perceived discrimination, an environmental stressor, on obesity. The study, under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (1180463), found that the relationship between this stressor and obesity was mediated by negative affective. This is very representative interesting L1 study, because it brings together environmental determinants (perceived discrimination) psychological processes related to depression (negative affectivity) and biological outcomes (obesity). Results were published in a scientific paper in 2021 (Paper # 64).

Study 051-L1 (From Metacognitive Efficiency to Interpersonal Sensitivity: An Introduction to the Interpersonal Mind from Social Cognition). Formal financing for this project under a Fondecyt Research Grant (1191708) ended in 2021 but research activities and data analysis continue and a few articles were published during the current reporting period. Researchers have explored the specific role of hydrocortisone in affecting metacognitive capabilities (e.g. the cognitive supervision of one's own performance in a task) above and beyond task-performance. The results are relevant for applied and clinical research about situations involving stress, anxiety, depression, or simply cortisol use. An additional paper stemming from this project (Paper #17) explored a parallel mechanism involved in physiological responses to social stress (i.e. the Trier Social Stress Test), this time focusing on brain wave activity. EEG research has been prominent in MIDAP within L1. In the study, MIDAP researchers explored how psychosocial stress modulates brain rhythms during an attentional task and a task-free period. This set-up was aimed to illuminate neural correlates underlying the process by which stress-related states can change the balance between goal-directed and stimulus-driven factors. Results outlined in the article indicate that laboratory-induced psychosocial stress affects performance by redirecting attentional resources toward internal threat-related thoughts. These findings are relevant and may contribute to designing new ways of clinical management of the human stress response that could help minimize detrimental effects of persistent stressful experiences. This study is producing interesting information about biological mechanisms that underlie psychosocial stress, a type of stress particularly relevant in some phenotypes of depression as well as in personality dysfunction.

Study 02-L1 (Facilitating and hindering factors of the search for psychological help in university students: An integrative and culturally relevant approach) is currently developed under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (11180115). Two publications submitted during 2021 (currently accepted for publication) have adapted instrumentation for local use. One article accepted in *Revista Iberoamericana de Diagnóstico y Evaluación* published a psychometric analysis of the Spanish adapted version of the Self-Concealment

Scale in a sample of Chilean university students, a group that has been steadily exhibited worrisome mental health outcomes. A second article accepted for publication in *Behavioral Psychology* describes the adaptation and psychometric evaluation of the General Help-Seeking Questionnaire in the same sample of university students. Instrument adaptation and psychometric evaluation remains a key component of MIDAP's activity and certainly continues to be an important contribution to local researchers and in some cases, clinicians.

Study 073-L1 (Using technology to facilitate international research on diagnosis and treatment of borderline personality disorder in adolescence, including low and middle-income countries – strategy based on direct clinical benefit). This study continues to develop as an international scientific collaboration including Chile, Switzerland, Kosovo, and Tanzania (<https://mhira-project.org/>). During 2021 the project revolved mainly around development of the software Mental Health Information Reporting Assistant (MHIRA) and local adaptation of instruments, with a focus on personality dysfunction. The team translated and adapted the Levels of Personality Functioning Scale (LPFS-BF) to assess Criterion A of the new classification of Personality Disorders according to ICD-11, and the Personality Inventory for DSM5 (PID-5BF+) to assess Criterion B, namely maladaptive personality traits. With this work there is local instrumentation available for research and diagnosis of personality disorder using new up-to-date diagnosis schemes. Papers will be submitted during 2022 and thus reported in the next report. Instrumentation is a key component for MHIRA because it is intended to be an evidence-based assessment tool. With this in mind the team submitted an article that is currently under review in *BMC Psychiatry*. The article presents a review of short (50 items or less), free and digitally available instruments to measure psychopathology in children and adolescents.

Line 1 COVID-19 and mental health studies. The Institute has actively developed research in the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. This adjustment of MIDAP's original research agenda is, of course sensible, given the impact of the pandemic on mental health and well-being. As reported in an article published in *Medwave*, social and contextual factors in Latin-America mixed with the high propagation rate of the virus have resulted in an increase in adverse outcomes related to the illness (Paper #58). An additional paper published in *PLoS Medicine* (Paper #24), focused on important power asymmetries in global health that have become transparent in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. Coloniality, a dynamic well established in Latin-America provides an adverse framework that may amplify detrimental effects of the pandemic on population health. Similarly, an article published in *Frontiers in Public Health* (Paper #37) reviewed the health policies activated in Chile during the pandemic, and highlights the need for increased spending and focus on mental health and on community participation to foster recovery from the detrimental effects of the pandemic. Relatedly, an article published in *Social Psychiatry and Psychiatric Epidemiology* examined the situation of psychiatric hospitals in Latin America and the Caribbean prior and during the COVID-19 pandemic highlighting challenges and opportunities for the future (Paper #40). Results from study 05-L1 (Meanings attributed to the quarantine experience due to COVID-19 from the perspective of the Chilean population: its effects on mental health and coping strategies) were presented at the 2021 Annual Conference of the Society for Psychotherapy Research in Heidelberg. Study 014-L1 (Mental health, stressors and psychological coping resources of higher education students in the Valparaíso region after the COVID-19 pandemic) delivered two reports outlining main results. A total of 749 university students were sampled and outcome data included anxiety, depression and alcohol use. A staggering 69,2% of participants endorsed moderate to severe levels of depressive symptomatology anxiety symptomatology. These results highlight the importance of addressing mental health needs of student populations during the pandemic. Results from this study were also published in *Revista Médica de Chile* (Paper #2). Study 074-L1 (Psychological effects of quarantine and social isolation during the COVID-19 crisis: an intensive longitudinal study) also examined mental health trends in the general population, this time using an intensive longitudinal design that address relevant outcomes during 35 consecutive days. One article published in 2021 (Paper #30) presented results of the adaptation and psychometric evaluation of the Fear of Illness Evaluation (FIVE).

An adapted version for Chile showed robust psychometric properties and also exhibited good predictive performance as related to PTSD symptoms in the studied sample. An additional article examined problematic internet use as a maladaptive coping strategy during COVID-19 lockdown in Santiago (Paper #5). Results suggest that problematic internet as a maladaptive coping strategy to avoid emotional discomfort predicts increases in depressive symptomatology. Another study looking at the impact of the COVID-19 on experiences of pregnancy and/or early parenting in Chile (Paper #16) found that retrospective report relative to pre-pandemic levels showed an increase in children's crying and tantrums as well as in parental irritability and sadness. Additionally, the study documented decreases in the capacity to calm down and on sleep quality in both, parents and children. Another study also examined psychological distress during the pandemic in a convenience community sample (Paper #32). This study focused on social determinants that were aggravated during the pandemic, including economic uncertainty. The need to implement psychosocial programs to mitigate effects of a pandemic on wellbeing are highlighted in this study. The experience of older adults was also examined in different articles published by MIDAP researchers during 2021. First an international position paper outlined a joint research agenda in the area of dementia and the COVID-19 pandemic in Chile, Germany and New Zealand (Paper #51). Another study looked at cognition and well-being in older adults during the pandemic in Latin America and the United States (Paper #46). The study concludes that the COVID-19 pandemic has differentially impacted the well-being of older ethnically diverse individuals in the US and in Latin America. In this context, the role of mediators like income and coping skills can be addressed to mitigate the impact of the pandemic. Similarly, another paper focused on the impact of social isolation during the pandemic in a sample of older adults with mild cognitive impairment (Paper #48). The study used a qualitative design to learn about the experiences of participants, concluding that potentially, older adults with mild cognitive impairment may have been mainly psychologically affected by social distancing and isolation, particularly individuals who were alone during the COVID-19 outbreak.

Several additional articles relevant for the activity of L1 were published during 2021. These articles stem partially from research projects or are associated with other collaboration by MIDAP researchers and are reported thus as research activity within the line. A summary of such articles is provided in this section.

- Regarding instrumentation studies one of MIDAP researchers participated in a consortium paper published at the *Lancet Psychiatry* outlining a consensus regarding the use of a core set of outcome measures for child and youth anxiety, depression, obsessive compulsive disorder and post-traumatic stress disorder (Paper #8).
- Using meta-analytic data from 40 countries, structural gender inequalities was explored in influencing the onset of postpartum depression. This article was published in the *Journal of Affective Disorders* (Paper #52) and found, among other things that countries with more liberal abortion policies had lower postpartum depression symptom prevalence.
- A local adaptation and psychometric evaluation of the Operationalized Psychodynamic Diagnosis self-report questionnaire (OPD-SQ) was published in *BMC Psychology* (Paper #66). This instrument allows for a detailed evaluation of personality functioning based on the OPD framework. It is now freely available for scientific and clinical use in Chile.
- A theoretical review regarding depression and psychological wellbeing in university students in Chile was published in the *Journal of Mood Disorders* (Paper #71). This article highlights the importance of addressing this particularly vulnerable group in terms of mental health and wellbeing.
- An article highlighting social determinants of mental health as related to social injustices was published by MIDAP researchers in *Revista de Psiquiatría Clínica* (Paper #79).

- An article outlining the experience of the implementation of mhGAP in Chile was published in *Revista Panamericana de Salud Pública* (Paper #45).

Longitudinal studies. MIDAP continues to invest in research modules concerning depression in major longitudinal studies being currently conducted in Chile. As reported previously, methodologically, the best scientific strategies to study basic components of the etiology, development, maintenance, and exacerbation of depressive symptomatology in a given context is to use of longitudinal research designs. As previously reported, MIDAP has partnered with Research Centers that are carrying out large-scale longitudinal studies. Results from the first two waves (2010 and 2012) from the Encuesta Longitudinal de Primera Infancia (ELPI) [National Longitudinal Survey of Early Childhood] were presented in a previous report (2017).

Results from the Center for the Study of Social Conflict and Cohesion (COES) through its Longitudinal Social Study of Chile (ELSOC) continue to be available for researcher at MIDAP. ELSOC collects data from over 3000 individuals aged between 18 and 75 years. This particular study uses a probabilistic sampling method and achieves a representativity level of 77% of the national population and 93% of urban-area population. ELSOC collects data through seven thematic modules, one of which –health and well-being– screens for mental health difficulties, including depression. A study published by MIDAP researchers in 2021 (Paper #7) used this data set to examine the role of socioeconomic determinants on mental health, specifically on depressive symptomatology. Results indicate that in Chile, and particularly for women, low social support and stressful life events were the most important predictors for severe depressive symptomatology.

The Center for Intercultural and Indigenous Studies (CIIR) through ELRI were also reported in the previous year, with a particular emphasis on the mediational role of social support between discrimination and depressive symptoms for indigenous individuals. ELRI collects data from 3617 individuals aged 18 to 60 years. Individuals belong to different indigenous and non-indigenous groups from the north, central, and southern parts of Chile. Third-wave data was published and are now available for analysis at MIDAP.

In summary, L1 studies continue to provide evidence in support of MIDAP's multidimensional model that understands depression nested within personality and receiving influences from cultural, biological, psychological and genetic variables. Scientific activity within L1 during 2021 focused on biological mechanisms, social determinants of mental health and instrument validation studies. An additional area of research within this line pertains focused COVID-10 and mental health research across different age groups and using different designs, including cross-sectional surveys, representative samples and intensive longitudinal designs.

a.2 Line of Research 2 (L2): Health promotion and psychosocial prevention. This line of research focuses on assessing the effectiveness of intervention strategies aimed at changing the early conditions associated with the development of depression and personality dysfunction, reducing the social exclusion of people with psychological disabilities, and fostering the treatment capabilities of mental health professionals. Two sets of studies have been focusing on the scientific goals of L2. On the one hand, several studies continue to examine the implementation and effectiveness of depression prevention programs for children, adolescents, adults and families. Their current status and previously unreported scientific achievements are reported summarily.

Study 002-L2 (Design and Piloting of a Telepsychiatry Service to Improve Mental Health Care for Children and Adolescents with Violation of Rights and/or Subject to the Law of Adolescent Criminal Responsibility) is being developed with a grant for Telemedicine research studies from the Clinical Hospital at Universidad de Chile. The feasibility study design was published in *Journal of Medical Internet Research Public Health and Surveillance* (Paper #14). An additional paper focusing on primary health for children and adolescents in institutionalized settings was also published during 2021 (Paper #49). Using grounded theory, this qualitative study looked at the experiences and challenges of primary

healthcare professionals, underlining experiences related to treatment fragmentation and lack of general coordination between institutions that are working with children and adolescents simultaneously.

Study 049-L2 (Trajectories and predictors of depressive and anxious symptomatology in family caregivers of people with dementia). This study is currently being developed under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (1191726). Formal funding will continue until 2023 and the team is currently working on analyzing collected data. During 2021 one paper was published in the *Journal of Alzheimer's Disease* (Paper #3) focusing on the impact of social isolation during the pandemic on people with Dementia and their family caregivers. Researchers concluded that social isolation during COVID-19 triggered a series of negative behavioral repercussions for people with dementia and for their families. For this study, data was aggregated from three different countries in Latin America (Brazil, Chile, and Argentina). An additional scoping review study was published focusing on met and unmet needs of dependent older people using the Camberwell Assessment of Need for the Elderly (CANE) measure (Paper#46). Results of the review suggest that unmet needs are primarily related to psychosocial areas, including company, daytime activities and psychological distress and to institutionalized populations. Importantly, unmet needs were related to depressive symptomatology dependency and caregiver burden.

Study 007-L2 (Randomized pilot feasibility study of a group intervention by videoconference to promote maternal sensitivity in mother/infant dyads attended in Primary Health Care). This study is currently funded by a seed grant from P. Universidad Católica de Chile. During 2021, data was collected and articles were written. Specifically, the study protocol was submitted for publication and is currently under review.

Study 010-L2 (Implementation and Evaluation of an Intervention with Video-feedback focused on Attachment Quality and Parental Reflective Function, aimed at Mother-Father-Child Triads with difficulties in Child Socioemotional Development). This is an older study that finished its formal funding period in 2017, but remains quite active with data being still analyzed. An article was published in 2021 (Paper #54) focusing on family dynamics, specifically on parental sensitivity and depressive symptomatology among mothers and fathers of toddlers. The studied sample included 80 Chilean mother-father-child triads in which all children were between 1 and 3 years old and presented some degree of socioemotional difficulty.

Study 090-L2 (Brief internet mentalization-based video feedback intervention to improve parental sensitivity in depressed mothers being treated in public health services: randomized controlled feasibility trial). This is a new study that is currently being conducted under a MIDAP FIP Grant. Data is currently being analyzed and is expected to be published and reported next year.

Study 091-L2 (Evaluating the effectiveness of a digital version of the preventive intervention “What Were We Thinking” to promote maternal mental health in the postpartum). This study is under way and has recently published preliminary results in a special bulletin of the International Society for the Study of Behavioral Development (ISSBD) on Digital Interventions (Paper #106).

Study 013-L2 (Construction of co-parenting in pairs of first-time parents). This study is currently being developed under an ANID Fondecyt Grant (11180820). A paper published during 2021 focused on the sanitary crisis due to COVID-19 (Paper #70). This study has been focusing on the role of fathers, and in this instance, the focus was on task distributions during lockdown. Results suggest that even though couples still visualize mothers as primary caregivers, lockdown conditions have increased involvement of fathers, but still inequality and sexist role-distributions appear to be prominent in Chilean society.

Study 089-L2 (Concordance in the physiological and subjective response to stress- the role of temperament and family functioning in emotional regulation and its relationship with symptomatology in late adolescence and emerging adulthood).

Study 089-L2 (Concordance in the physiological and subjective stress response. The role of temperament and family context in emotional regulation in late adolescents and young adults). This study was awarded

in 2020 under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (1201576) and also brings together environmental and relational components to build causal models that explain the emergence of psychopathology. Interestingly, this study builds on previous research by MIDAP, specifically about a discrepancy between subjective and physiological responses to social stress. The study design and scope were presented in October 2021 at the 1st International Encounter on Socioemotional Skills, held at Universidad del Desarrollo, one of MIDAP's hosting institutions.

Recently published findings (Paper #18) reveal that temperamental components (including effortful control and frustration tolerance) are directly associated with parental control, a condition that typically inhibits or hampers adolescent autonomy and identity. Lower levels of these temperamental components were associated with higher levels of maternal parental control. The study provides an interesting contextual framework to understand the development of important capacities in adolescents that may be related to future mental health outcomes.

Study 012-L2 (Prevention of depression in adolescents in schools using mindfulness-based interventions), continued to explore the preventive effects of mindfulness-based interventions and the convenience of their deployment in school settings. During 2021, an article was published exploring subjective vulnerability in mindfulness-based interventions (Paper #13).

Study 018-L2 (Intervention in Attachment and Mentalization in caregivers of pre-school children) continued to develop over 2021. One article was published reporting effects of a mentalization-based group intervention with video-feedback for mothers of preschool children (Paper #56). Results showed that mothers in the experimental group reached lower levels of maternal stress and higher use of mental language, and their children showed lower risk in their socio-emotional development. Two additional studies exploring early parenting processes and mental health and development outcomes in preschoolers were published in *Children*. The first article explored maternal mental health and maternal stress and their influence on preschooler's behavioral symptoms (Paper #21). The second paper explores mother's use of regulatory talk with toddlers in a sample of Chilean and US dyads (Paper #23).

Several additional articles were published by line 2 researchers during 2021 that are either partially related to reported studies or emergent products stemming from additional collaborative projects. A summary of these articles and projects is presented in this section.

- A protocol for a systematic review and meta-analysis on interventions to reduce stigma towards mental disorders in young people was published in the *BMJ Open* (Paper #11)
- A study published in the *Journal of Experimental Gerontology* presented effects of a 40-week multicomponent exercise program and branched chain amino acids supplementation on functional fitness and mental health in frail older persons (Paper #26).
- A study published in *Children and Youth Services Review* explored ethnic identity and life satisfaction in indigenous adolescents, focusing on the mediating role of resilience (Paper #28).
- A study published in *PLoS One* examined the role of perceived discrimination and contextual problems among children and adolescents in northern Chile (Paper #33).

In summary, studies in L2 continue to provide good coverage regarding health promotion and prevention across the life span with increased scientific activities focusing on older persons, as a result of the first results of a ANID Fondecyt Grant (1191726). An emphasis on internet-based interventions continues to be present which presents with significant benefits in terms of coverage and dissemination. Indeed, the importance of internet-based intervention for prevention of depression in adolescence has been further researched. A focus on parenting as related to socioemotional development and mental health outcomes is certainly present and may provide additional pathways for preventive and promotional interventions. The merits of video-feedback and mentalization-informed interventions have been examined and appear

to be feasible and effective strategies to strengthen socioemotional development in preschool children and toddlers.

a.3 Line of Research 3 (L3): Psychotherapeutic interventions and change processes. This line of research focuses on the analysis of change processes and on the effectiveness of psychological interventions. Projects developed within L2 aim to answer the following research questions: **What are the characteristics of patients, therapists, and therapeutic models associated with the therapeutic change process and its outcomes? What change mechanisms are involved in the generation of therapeutic outcomes? What type of interactions occur between the profiles of patient and/or therapists, process variables, and psychotherapeutic outcomes?** Their current status of L3 studies and previously unreported scientific achievements are reported summarily.

Study 046-L3 (Characterization of the episodes of rupture and resolution of the alliance from the affective-facial communication of patients and therapists and their association with psychotherapeutic change: Distinctions for an effective clinical practice). This study is being developed under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (11180671). Formal funding was extended until October 2022 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Currently, the team is focused on data analysis and paper writing. During 2021 results were presented at the 52th Annual International Meeting of the Society for Psychotherapy Research, held in Heidelberg, Germany. An article was also published in 2021 in *Frontiers in Psychology* (Paper #1). The article highlighted the relevance of interdisciplinary research on affect regulation. Further results are expected to be published in 2022 and 2023.

Study 015-L3 (Psychotherapy During Lockdown: How Psychotherapists Meet and How They Perceive Current Practice). This study was presented at the 52th Annual International Meeting of the Society for Psychotherapy Research, held in Heidelberg, Germany. The study surveyed a number of psychotherapies and explored how the practice of psychotherapy was modified due to the conditions enforced for the mitigation of the COVID-19 pandemic.

Study 003-L3 (Effectiveness of a brief Dialectical Behavior Therapy Skills training group for Borderline Personality Disorder in a public outpatient service in Chile: a multiple baseline comparison). This study was awarded a grant from MIDAP (FIP). Recruitment for the study started in 2021 and continues in 2022. 24 patients have been recruited in a public hospital in Chile. The study involves a multiple-baseline design and additionally a baseline and post-treatment measurement using Ecological Momentary Assessment.

Study 048-L3 (Towards a comprehensive model of the therapeutic alliance in psychotherapy with depressed patients: understanding the relationship between the alliance, patient/therapist characteristics, process variables, and outcome). This study is still recruiting participants. Recruitment has been quite challenging due to the pandemic. Currently five centers are participating in the study and to date 200 participants have been recruited. Formal financing will continue until 2023.

Study 006-L3 (Psychotherapeutic change process in boys and girls who have been victims of sexual assaults: Towards a comprehensive model of the influence of factors of responsible adults, interventions and the therapeutic relationship; FONDECYT REGULAR 1200627). An article about the therapeutic relationship in child psychotherapy was published during 2021 in *Psychotherapy Research* (Paper #15). This study employed a qualitative methodology within a discovery-oriented approach based on grounded theory. Twelve psychotherapy triads composed of children (aged 6-10), their parents and psychotherapist. Therapy for children is viewed as a relational experience, where the development of a positive relationship requires different and evolving positions from participants. An additional paper was published in *Psyche* about the views (or messages) from children and adolescents regarding the process of healing through psychotherapy (Paper # 63). Finally, an article was published in *Children & Society* about talk and silence in a narrative study of child psychotherapy (Paper #27).

Studies 033-L3 (Distinctions in the Diagnosis and Prognosis of Depression in Psychotherapy: Relational Patterns, Internal Conflicts, and Vulnerabilities of Psychic Functioning and their Relationship to Psychotherapy Process Variables) and 035-L3 (Profiles of depression and their relationship to therapeutic change) continue to examine heterogeneity in depression and personality dysfunction and their bearing on therapy process and outcome with a grant from FONDECYT (Iniciación 11170561). During 2012 an article was published in *Revista Brasileira de Psicoterapia* focusing on patterns of therapeutic change using focus-oriented therapy (Paper # 75). An additional article was published in *Frontiers in Psychology* regarding intra-session reflective functioning and personality functioning during psychotherapy (Paper #31).

Study 008-L3 (Training in psychotherapeutic skills for the management of depression in Primary Health Care). This study developed under an ANID FONIS grant with formal financing terminating in December 2021. The year 2021 was fundamentally a year of execution of the study, pilot training of the participants and the evaluation of said pilot was carried out. Advances in results were presented in various scientific spaces: - June 2021 SPR Conference. Competencies for Depression Psychotherapy in PHC: Validity of a Training Program for Psychologists based on Evidence, Common Factors Model and the Opinion of the Protagonists (Patients, Therapists, Experts) - September 2021 Psychotherapy for Depression in PHC: Validation of a Protocol- Implementation of Online Program - Acceptability. IX Virtual Conference SOCHITAB, - November 2021. Training in psychotherapeutic skills for the management of depression in primary health care. VI Conference on Research and Public Policies in Mental Health of the Ministry of Health.

Study 022-L3 (Effectiveness of an intervention via the Internet for the improvement of depression: Towards the improvement of the management of depression). Formal financing of this project via a Fonis grant has terminated. However, data is still being analyzed by the research team. A paper with results of the study was published in 2021 in *JMIR Mental Health* (Paper #55). The active arm of the study involving an adjunctive internet-based intervention to enhance treatment for depression in adults did not show superiority compared to the treatment as usual condition. Likely this result can be explained by the effectiveness of the treatment as usual condition or to the limited use of the internet adjunctive treatment.

Study 050-L3 (Development of a Comprehensive Model of Psychotherapy with LGBT Patients: A Qualitative Study of the Experiences of Patients and Psychotherapists). This study is currently developed under a ANID Fondecyt Grant (1190270). During 2021 work focused on article writing and data analysis. A paper examining experiences of psychological and psychotherapeutic support for LGBT youth who have survived a suicide process was published in *Revista Interamericana de Psicología* (Paper #57). Using a qualitative approach based on Grounded Theory, 30 interviews were analyzed. Most interestingly, the study concluded that these experiences are marked by a "so close and yet so far" concerning the availability of psychological support and yet who this support fails to take into consideration specific aspects of the LGBT experience.

Study 037-L3 (Effectiveness of a computer-assisted cognitive-behavioral therapy for adolescents with depression being treated in primary health care centers in Santiago de Chile). This study has terminated formal funding, but research activities continue. During 2021 an article was published in the *International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health* (Paper #12). The article presented feasibility and acceptability data from the "Cuida tu ánimo" (Take care of your mood) app in Chile and in Colombia. Acceptance of the program was adequate but adherence remained rather low. Preliminary results show that the interventions were effective in reducing in depressive and anxious symptoms in the Chilean but not the Colombian group. The study yields interesting insights about the new do customize and improve the app to achieve improved adherence.

Several additional articles were published by line 3 researchers during 2021 that are either partially related to reported studies or emergent products stemming from additional collaborative projects. A summary of these articles and projects is presented in this section.

- A meta-analysis of the effects of psychological treatment of perinatal depression was published in *Psychological medicine* (Paper #60).
- An article on therapist's understanding of moments of "meeting" and their contribution to the therapeutic alliance was published in *Psychotherapy Research* (Paper # 4).
- An article about meaningful moments in systemic psychotherapy for social anxiety disorder from the perspective of patients and their therapists was published in *PLoS One* (Paper #6).
- Following MIDAP's focused research on video-feedback interventions. An article was published in *Trials* with the design of a feasibility trial of a video intervention for primary caregivers in a child psychiatric ward (Paper #9).
- A systematic review and meta-analysis about the effects of Cognitive Behavior Therapy for depression in patients with a concurrent diagnosis of Borderline Personality Disorder was published in *Cognitive Therapy and Research* (Paper #25).

In summary, L3 continues to concentrate a significant proportion of MIDAP's scientific efforts and scientific output. From effectiveness outcome research to studies focusing on micro processes of discourse-voice regulation, L3 provides a broad set of projects which have supplied findings that contribute significantly to understand mechanisms involved in psychotherapeutic change. New findings have emerged from the study of psychotherapy for children's survivors of sexual abuse. Also, research on psychotherapy for LGBTQ+ populations continue to deepen as other studies that have been developing over the years have supplied final results. Research on psychotherapeutic interventions in public health care settings has strengthened, including primary health care services as well as tertiary, specialized treatment settings such as a hospital.

a.4 Line of Research 4 (L4): Mitigation of Chronicity in the Course of Depression. This line of research focuses on the patient's recovery and on reducing the chronicity and recurrence of depression. Research projects developed within L4 address the following questions: **(a) What are the post-treatment variables that are associated to decreased rates of relapse and chronicity? (b) what characterizes patients with recurrent and complex depression (depression comorbid with personality dysfunction), and how should they be managed in order to reduce recurrence of depressive disorders and its burden on the subjective and societal level?** The current status and previously unreported scientific achievements of L4 studies are reported summarily.

Study 043-L4 (A collaborative computer-assisted cognitive-behavioral educational and psychological treatment for depressed patients with chronic disease at primary care). This study is currently financed by a ANID Fondecyt Grant. The first article related to this study was published in 2021 in the *International Journal of Environmental Research and Public Health* (Paper#10). The published study evaluated the feasibility of a technology assisted collaborative care program for depression in people with diabetes and/or high blood pressure attending primary health care. Two thirds of recruited patients achieved response 12 weeks after baseline. The program was perceived as acceptable and the program was partially feasible. Based on preliminary effectivity, acceptability and feasibility data, a cluster randomized trial has been designed and initiated. The research protocol was published in *BMC Psychiatry* (Paper #19).

A set of articles published during 2021 relate specifically to the study of early adverse childhood experiences and early maltreatment and its bearing on mental health outcomes including depression. A paper published in the *European Journal of Psychotraumatology* explored the population-attributable risk of adverse childhood experiences for high suicide risk, psychiatric admissions, and recurrent

depression in depressed outpatients (Paper #34). Results indicate that a significant percentage of adverse outcomes are, in fact attributable to early adverse childhood experiences. A second paper, published in *Depression & Anxiety* further explored this issue in the same sample to examine the specific contribution of early adverse stress to complex and severe depression, strengthening this finding (Paper #35). A third study published in *Frontiers in Psychiatry* conducted a systematic review and meta-analysis of treatment interventions for depressive and bipolar disorders when early adverse stress was reported (Paper #39). A fourth study provided a literature review on potential effects of childhood sexual abuse on psychological wellbeing of adults. Additionally, a sample of 641 adults was surveyed from the population. A staggering 31.4% of surveyed adults reported been victims of some type of abuse before they reached the age of 18. 70% of these participants were women. This finding highlights the ubiquity of sexual trauma in the population. The study further documented those adult levels of well-being were significantly lower for those who had been exposed to sexual trauma.

In summary, focus on chronicity and recovery continued to be developed within L4. Current focus of this research line involves the role of early adverse experiences and childhood abuse and maltreatment on mental health outcomes and the role of chronic health conditions on treatment response to anti-depressive interventions as well as treatment adaptations and innovations to optimize treatment results for this group of patients.

- b) Productivity:** During the third year of MIDAP, 109 scientific documents were published, more than any previous year. This likely resulted from the addition of new Young Researchers as well as from diminished fieldwork because of the pandemic. Larger projects that had started in the previous years are also starting to yield first results, resulting in more publications. Publications include 103 articles, and six other scientific publication, including special bulletins, policy papers, reports and treatment guidelines. With respect to scientific articles, 70 (68%) were published in journals indexed in Web of Science/SCOPUS. Of these 70 articles, 30 (43%) were published in quartile 1 (Q1) and 19 (27%) in quartile 2 (Q2) journals. When looking at publications by line of research, most publications originated from L1 (47%) followed by L2 (33%), L2 (22%) and L4 (4%).

Out of a total of 109 publications authored or co-authored by MIDAP researchers, in 47 of them, only one researcher participated, in 26 of them two researchers from MIDAP participated, 15 articles were authored by three or more researchers, and 14 articles were co-authored by 4 or more researchers (see Annex 3.7). This means that a substantial part of the publications of the Institute were collaborative, and we will continue to encourage associative scientific work and publishing between researchers. Students were part of 30 of these publications which also points to an important focus of further development, namely to encourage joint publications between AR and students. Also, out of 109 articles published during 2021, 42 involved Young Researchers or Postdoctoral Researchers as co-authors (15 were led by such researchers) and 30 included student participation (10 were student-led).

MIDAP maintains the position reported in 2017 regarding “open access” publications. Some of these journals are of high quality (for example *Frontiers in Psychology* or *PLOS One*), they have rigorous peer-review procedures, and high-quality output with high dissemination, because there are no costs associated with access to articles. The cost of publication continues to be a difficulty for our researchers, particularly because Chilean researchers typically do not qualify for standard discounts given the development level of the country.

- c) Outstanding publications:** Because scientific output in high-impact journals is of high relevance for the dissemination of MIDAP’s scientific achievements, publications in the following journals are highlighted:

During 2021, the first of MIDAP books published by Springer was published. The book *Depression and personality dysfunction: Towards the understanding of complex depression* was edited by Drs. De la Parra, Dagnino and Behn and included several chapters on basic psychopathology and treatment for patients with concurrent depression and personality dysfunction. This publication highlights MIDAPS

standing internationally and has the potential to become an important window to the Institute's research agenda and main findings.

The participation of MIDAP's researchers in a position paper about outcome measures for the assessment of children and adolescents published in *Lancet Psychiatry* is quite an achievement and provides ample visibility. This study is likely to become a heavily cited reference to inform studies as well as clinical procedures involving evidence-based assessment worldwide.

The article "Depression and antidepressants during pregnancy: Craniofacial defects due to stem/progenitor cell deregulation mediated by serotonin" published in *Frontiers in Cell and Developmental Biology* deserves attention because it is the first MIDAP article involving specific research with antidepressant. This is an important area that had not been explored in previous research.

- d) Congress Presentations:** During 2021, 104 presentations were delivered, which signals an 85% increase from last year, likely due to lifting travel bans due to COVID-19. Of these presentations, 80% of them were delivered physically or virtually in international venues (details are presented in Appendix II). 35% of all presentations included MIDAP students (in about half of these students are first authors), which is an important metric regarding capacity building. 29 presentations stem from L1 (11 national, 18 international), 29 from L2 (12 national, 17 international), 46 from L3 (11 national, 35 international).

Other achievements:

- **Patents:** Nothing to report during 2021
- **Intellectual property:** No information is reported here during the 2021 period.
- **Organization of Scientific Events:** Three scientific events were planned and executed during 2021. In November 2021, the III Latin-American Workshop for research in Depression and Personality was organized by MIDAP. The focus of the workshop was on depression heterogeneity. The workshop included lectures by MIDAP researchers and by guest scientists that are part of MIDAP's international networks. Graduate students from Chile, Argentina, Colombia, United Kingdom and Nicaragua enrolled in the workshop. Second, in December 2021 an International Seminar of Borderline Personality Disorder was organized. This seminar was organized between MIDAP, Universidad Diego Portales Center for Studies in Psychology and Psychotherapy, the Chilean Institute for Personality Disorders and the Latin American Regional Group of the International Society for the Study of Personality Disorders (ISSPD). Between July and August 2021, MIDAP sponsored a series of talks related the promulgation of the new mental health law (Law 21.331). This was an open series of talks organized by Universidad de Chile and MIDAP among several other institutions. During May, 2021, psychotherapists from Latin America participated in an international seminar organized by MIDAP entitled "Psychotherapy during the pandemic: experiences and adaptations of Latin-American psychotherapists". During April 2021, MIDAP sponsored the organization of an International Scientific Meeting entitled "The role of emotional regulation in mental health: basic and applied perspectives". This event was hosted by Universidad del Desarrollo and Universidad de Talca, and sponsored by MIDAP. See details in **Annex 4**.
- **Scientific Editorial Boards:** The participation of different MIDAP's researchers in Editorial Boards is showed in **Appendix IV**. Dr. Mariane Krause served in the editorial board of *Psychotherapy Research*, *Revista de Psicología Universidad de Chile*, and *Terapia Psicológica*. Drs. Diego Cosmelli and Jaime Silva served in the editorial board of *Revista Chilena de Neuropsicología*. Drs. Alberto Botto, Guillermo de la Parra, Juan Pablo Jiménez, Jaime Silva, and Felipe Martínez served on the editorial board of *Gaceta de Psiquiatría Universitaria*. Dr. Luis Salazar served on the editorial board of *Drug Metabolism and Personalized Therapy*, the *Brazilian Journal of Pharmaceutical Sciences*, *Clinica Chemica Acta*, *Pharmaceutics* and *Frontiers in Pharmacology*. Dr. Alex Behn served on the board of *Frontiers in Psychiatry*. Dr. Matías Irrarrázaval served on the editorial board of *Revista*

Chilena de Psiquiatría y Neurología de la Infancia y la Adolescencia. Dr. Alvaro Vergés served on the editorial board of the *Journal of Studies on Alcohol and Drugs*. - **Awards:** During 2021 the following researchers at MIDAP received awards (**Appendix VI**):
 - Alvaro Jiménez Molina and Graciela Rojas received a recognition (Mención Honrosa) in the Seventh version of Premio Educación Financiera (PEF). This recognition was for the publication with other colleagues in an academic journal CIPER about depression and economic burden related to debt in Chile.
 - Graciela Rojas received an Award for Academic Trajectory from the Medical College of Chile. This recognition was awarded to Dr. Rojas for her research and training activities over the years.
 - Claudia Miranda received an Academic Distinction from Universidad Andrés Bello. This award was in recognition for her Grant to build a Millennium Institute for Care Research (MICARE).

4. **Education and Capacity Building**

- a) **Education, Training, and Capacity Building:** During 2021, MIDAP added 28 new young people, reaching the figure of 206 young trainees since its beginning. Specifically, MIDAP has hosted 30 undergraduate students, 80 master's students, 83 doctoral students, and 13 Postdoctoral Researchers (PR). Twenty-two Young Researchers (YR) have been part of MIDAP during these years. This large overall figure reflects young people's interest in joining MIDAP, since they regard it as a center of excellence relevant to their careers.

Fifty-one doctoral students, 36 master's students, and 13 undergraduate students were part of MIDAP during 2021. Detailed information in Annex 5. As usual, most doctoral students are enrolled in the Doctoral Program in Psychotherapy, jointly offered by UC and UCh. Other students are enrolled in Doctoral Programs in Psychology (UC, UCh, USACH, UDP, and UFRO), in UDEC's Doctoral Program in Mental Health, in UDD's Doctoral Program in Developmental Sciences and Psychopathology, in UC's Doctoral Program in Neurosciences, and in Doctoral Programs in Public Health (UC and UCh). Most of MIDAP's master's students came from UC's MSc in Clinical Psychology, while the rest came from UCh's MSc in Child and Adolescent Clinical Psychology and UC's MScs in Psychology and Health Psychology.

Sixteen YRs were part of MIDAP during 2021, 63% of whom received fees for their work as researchers in studies conducted within MIDAP. Participating in a research team is in and of itself a learning opportunity and a chance to develop knowledge and research skills. All YRs, PRs, and students are an important target audience in MIDAP's general research meetings and, through predetermined quotas, they have access to regular workshops and seminars endorsed and/or organized by MIDAP. Despite the pandemic situation, MIDAP gives them the chance to apply for partial grants to support conference attendance and thus improve their ability to present results in national and international contexts and establish collaboration networks. The numbers for 2021 are presented in the next section.

Unfortunately, the persistence of the pandemic situation this year again made it impossible for students to do their thesis internships under the auspices of MIDAP in foreign centers of excellence.

Same the last year, the Vice-president's Office for Research of Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile granted MIDAP CLP \$10,000,000 (approx. US\$13,000), to support Catalina Sieverson's second and final year of postdoctoral research (she should finish her study around September 2022). In order to assign a new postdoctoral grant from March 2022, applicants to a new 2-year FIP projects launched by mid-September 2021 were asked to incorporate to their staff a postdoctoral researcher to be partially financed by these funds. The result of this competition was announced in January 2022.

Apart from its usual activities for training young researchers from Chile and the rest of Latin America, MIDAP's continuing education area offered several courses mainly aimed at young audiences or private sector professionals who wished to learn about new tools and acquire knowledge applicable to their fields of expertise. MIDAP continued co-organizing several courses on mentalization together with Mentalizar Chile in 2021. In addition, in the area directly focused on research, MIDAP again organized a Taller Latinoamericano de Investigación en Depresión y Personalidad (Latin American Summer School on Depression and Personality Research), this time in a remote format, offered free of charge to Chilean and Latin American graduate students. See the next section for more details.

- b) **Achievements and results:** As in previous years, the activities and figures related to human capital training during 2021 have helped us to continue to comply with one of our global aims: to make a decisive contribution to the generation of advanced human capital in Chile and Latin America through graduate education and post-doctoral training and collaboration with universities in master's- and undergraduate-level education.

Unlike last year, 2021 was once again relevant in the context of human resources training due to the high number of students interested in joining the Institute –as specified in the preceding section– and also

because of the high number of graduates. Twenty MIDAP students successfully completed their theses: seven doctoral students and 13 master's students. Furthermore, 7 other students obtained their bachelor's degree in psychology. More details in Appendix 4.

Five of these new PhDs, Fanny Leyton, Yamil Quevedo, Ana María Gallardo, Lucía Núñez, and Karina Zúñiga, who graduated from the Doctoral Program in Psychotherapy, are involved in ongoing MIDAP studies and were invited to stay at the Institute as Collaborator Researchers. Javiera Rosell, who was awarded a PhD in Psychology (UC), joined the Millennium Institute MICARE as a Postdoctoral Researcher.

In addition, and as a result of the internal competition for FIP research funds, former MIDAP doctoral graduate and current Collaborator Researcher Yamil Quevedo joined the institute as a Postdoctoral Researcher to work for 2 years in the study “Effectiveness of a Brief Dialectical Behavior Therapy Skills Training Group for Borderline Personality Disorder in a Public Outpatient Service in Chile: A Multiple Baseline Comparison”, coordinated by MIDAP Associate Researcher Alex Behn.

Between April and June 2021, Colombian doctoral Psychology student Diana Bedoya conducted an online internship with Associate Researcher Pía Santelices on various aspects of her thesis work and other activities (more details in Annex 5.2b).

A third Taller Latinoamericano (Latin American Summer School) was organized by MIDAP, under the auspices of the project REDES180104 PCI-ANID “International Network for the study of the heterogeneity of depression”, led by MIDAP researcher Alex Behn, together with colleagues from of Global Mental Health Lab of Columbia University, USA, and the Centre for Psychological Services Research of Sheffield University, UK. Locally coordinated by Alex Behn, the workshop entitled “Taller Latinoamericano de Investigación en Depresión y Personalidad: Investigando la heterogeneidad” [Latin American Summer School for Depression and Personality Research: Studying Heterogeneity] was held between 15 and 17 November 2021. The workshop was delivered remotely and free of charge to Latin American doctoral and master's degree students. A total of 14 professionals from Chile, Paraguay, Colombia, Nicaragua, and Argentina participated. The workshop was taught by foreign experts Jaime Delgadillo, Helen Verdeli, Birgit Watzke, Harry Banyard, and Michael Barkham, together with MIDAP Researchers Alex Behn, Paula Dagnino, and Juan Pablo Jiménez. They conducted open master classes (transmitted via YouTube to all those who wished to join on-line) and also supervised the participants in the presentation of their ongoing theses, supporting them with comments and suggestions. Finally, the experts also supervised two training workshops for the students, one on publications and the other on professional development.

Out of 104 studies presented at national and international conferences during 2021, 34 involved YRs and PRs as co-authors (20 were led by them), while 35 included student participation, 9 of them led by the student. Of these nine students, 5 graduate students received financial support from MIDAP received financial support to pay for registration fees for the congresses, as all events were held remotely, through application processes established by MIDAP to provide such aid.

Out of 109 articles published during 2021, 42 involved YRs or PRs as co-authors (15 were led by such researchers) and 30 included student participation (10 were student-led).

Eleven diploma programs directed by MIDAP's researchers requested sponsorship from the Institute in 2021. All of these programs are a fundamental part of the activities conducted by MIDAP in collaboration with other universities:

- Personality Disorders: Current Perspectives and Clinical Tools (UC)
- Diagnosis, Indication, and Strategies in Psychotherapy: Operationalized Psychodynamic Diagnosis (OPD-2) (UC)
- Interventions for Depression and Other Mood Disorders: Conceptualization and Intervention Strategies (UC)

- Mindfulness and Psychotherapy (UC)
- Mindfulness and Self-Care: Mind and Body in Balance (UC)
- Couples Psychotherapy from a Systemic-Relational Perspective (UC)
- Psychotherapy Research for Mental Health Professionals (UDP)
- Postgraduate Degree in Psychotherapy: Clinical Tools for Current Practice (Universidad Alberto Hurtado-UAH)
- Psychopathology of Bonding: Diagnosis and Treatment (UC)
- Mood Disorders for Psychologists (UdeCh)
- Psychotherapy and mental health in gender, sexual, and relationship diversity (UDP)

Due to the high interest that it aroused, the course **“Suicide Risk: Assessment and Management”** was again offered twice during 2021, both times online. The sessions, held in April and August, were led by Adjunct Researchers Susana Morales and Orietta Echávarri, together with Collaborator Researchers Tita Szmulewicz, Claudia Moya, María de la Paz Maino, and Cristóbal Morales. The attendees were 125 health-care professionals and others working in related disciplines who are in contact with potentially at-risk adolescents or adults. As usual, its objective was to present effective tools for detecting, evaluating, and managing suicide risk to professionals working with people who may be susceptible to it.

For the first time, MIDAP offered the training seminar **“Suicide risk and therapeutic approaches in LGBT+ population”**. This program is carried out by part of the team that has been teaching the course “Suicide risk: Assessment and Management” for seven years, this time focused on the LGBT+ population. Sixty professionals from all regions of Chile, as well as from Mexico and Spain participated. Most of them specialized in psychology, but some worked in medicine, nursing, social work, and pedagogy, among other fields.

The course **“Early childhood video-feedback intervention”** was held in January 2021, online. The teaching team of the course included the Associate Researcher Marcia Olhaberry, Postdoctoral Researcher Catalina Sieverson, and Young Researcher María José León. The three professionals are also the authors of the “Guide for psychotherapeutic intervention with video-feedback: 0 to 5 years”, which is used in the course. This course was designed to provide initial theoretical and practical content for participants to understand and use video feedback when working with young children and their families. It was attended by 39 young professionals.

Two courses were co-organized with Mentalizar Chile in 2021. The first one, held on June 11, 12, 18, and 19, was the official course on **“Reflective Functioning Evaluation in the Parent Development Interview (PDI)”**, led by Dr. Marta Golanó (Spain), accredited by the University Mental Health Institute of Universidad Ramón Llull (Barcelona). This was the first time this course was given in Chile and in Spanish. It was attended by 22 professional psychologists and psychiatrists working in the academic and clinical fields, at both public and private institutions.

Between October 18 and 20, the second version of the Official Course of **“Mentalization Based Treatment for Children (MBT-C)”**, accredited by the Yale Child Study Center, was held. This course grants recognition as MBT-C Certified Practitioner by the Anna Freud National Centre for Children and Families. The course was held remotely, which allowed the participation of professionals from several regions of Chile, as well as from Colombia, Peru, and Uruguay. The course was based on the text “Mentalization-Based Treatment for Children. A Time Limited Approach”, written –among others– by Dr. Norka Malberg, facilitator of the course.

As in 2020, participants from other regions of Chile and from other countries were able to enroll, which has increased MIDAP’s visibility and extended the range of young public or private sector professionals wishing to learn about new tools and acquire knowledge applicable to their fields of expertise. In 2021,

our courses had participants from all regions of Chile, along with professionals from Mexico, Peru, Costa Rica, Panama, and Colombia.

c) Destination of students:

The situation of MIDAP students, as it relates to their destination upon completion of their studies, has not changed during 2021. Although some students who have obtained their doctoral degrees in recent years are affiliated with their universities on fixed-term contracts and without an academic position, others have gradually signed permanent contracts in a number of Chilean institutions. In addition, many of them are still involved in clinical work, putting into practice what they learned throughout the doctoral program as well as the results of their own research. As previously explained, most of them are now associated with MIDAP as Postdoctoral Researchers or Collaborator Researchers. Although the position of Collaborator Researcher is unpaid, MIDAP allows members in this group to apply for funding to attend conferences and supports them in their applications for competitive grants, thus enabling them to continue growing as researchers.

As for master's degree graduates, only a few decide to continue their academic careers. Those who have done so have generally continued their studies under the tutelage of MIDAP.

5. Networking and other collaborative work

a) Networking: During 2021, MIDAP continues to consolidate its international footprint, maintaining and strengthening many of its international networks, even though international travel remained difficult during 2021 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As it has been previously reported, MIDAP's international activity can be organized in six areas of scientific work: (a) Depression and Personality Dysfunction, (b) Biological and Personality Interactions and Cultural Aspects in the Development of Psychological Disorders, (c) Change Processes in Psychotherapy, (d) Longitudinal Studies on the Development of Depression, (e) Mindfulness and other Contemplative Practices, (f) E-Mental Health Research, and (g) Early Developmental Conditions. Of note, during 2021, is that XX% of all publications produced by MIDAP stem from formal international scientific networks. Collaborative activity within the above-mentioned areas will be reported under the current heading (Networking and Annex 6.1) as well as under the heading other Collaborative activities (Annex 6.2).

a.1) Depression and Personality Dysfunction

The scientific collaboration to establish an International Network for the Study of the Heterogeneity of Depression (CONICYT, PCI REDES180104), continues to develop with researchers from The University of Sheffield and from Columbia University. In addition to one Master student in Chile, a doctoral student joined the project and is currently working on a project to map depression heterogeneity using longitudinal datasets from Chile. Interestingly, she will be able to compare her profile analyses with those from UK samples using the same scripts from analysis. The manuscript of meta-analysis of the effect of Borderline Personality Disorder on the outcomes of Cognitive Behavioral therapy for depression was published in *Cognitive Therapy and Research*. Funding for this project from ANID was extended until December 2021 because of the restrictions for international research due to the pandemic. A Latin American Workshop for Research in Depression and Personality was organized by MIDAP with funding from this Network and focused on the topic of depression heterogeneity. All members from this international network as well as students participated in this three-day workshop that attracted additional students from Chile, Argentina, Colombia, and the UK.

a.2) Biological and Personality Interactions and Cultural Aspects in the Development of Psychological Disorders. MIDAP's new Young Researcher Dr. Natalia Salinas (Universidad de la Frontera) has developed an international network entitled Culture and Behavior Laboratory with colleagues from Loma Linda University, USA. During 2021, Dr. Betancourt from Loma Linda University visited Chile to work on network activities. This network also includes students, joined publications and conference and periodic coordination meetings as well as a formal agreement of collaboration. Currently some research and exchange activities of the network are financed by an ANID Fondecyt Grant (11180115). Another network, the Platform for Social Research on Mental Health in Latin America (PLASMA) involves researchers from Chile, Brasil, Uruguay, Argentina, Perú, Colombia, Ecuador and Panamá. MIDAP has sponsored this group from its beginning and currently it has become a stable platform for scientific collaboration. Periodic scientific output is published in the website (blogplasma.wordpress.com), and the network has produced joint publications. Finally, in the area of biological and personality interaction, joint scientific work has been conducted between researchers at MIDAP and Heidelberg University. This group has focused on the dyadic interactions (e.g. couples' therapy) and oxytocin and cortisol secretion. The group is working on a publication contained results of research conducted jointly during 2021.

a.3) Change Processes in Psychotherapy. The international network "Psychotherapy and Change – Latin-American Network of Psychotherapy Research" includes members from Chile, Argentina, Brazil, Colombia, México, Perú, Panamá, and Ecuador. MIDAP has supported this important local network in an effort to strengthen regional ties in the area of psychotherapy research. New members joined during 2021 so that more regional coverage has been achieved. A formal collaboration agreement has been signed by involved centers and researchers. The network "Active Ingredients of Change in Transference

Focused Psychotherapy: Towards the identification of candidate interventions for short-term, modular interventions for patients with complex, treatment-resistant depression" remains active. This network involves researchers from MIDAP, from Cornell and from City University of New York. Currently a paper co-authored by researchers in Santiago and New York is about to be submitted for publication.

a.4) Mindfulness and other Contemplative Practices. MIDAP continues its ongoing scientific and training networks within the area of Mindfulness. A new version of this international network consolidates joint work between Chile and Germany (Heidelberg University). During 2021, researchers prepared a joint research project entitled "Contemplative Practices in Psychotherapy (COPiT) – Implementation of contemplative practices in psychotherapy in German speaking countries and Chile". This project will be submitted for funding. Meanwhile researchers at MIDAP continue to collaborate with researchers at the Zürich University of Applied Sciences, University of Rome and recently, University of Almería in Spain. Currently a formal agreement exists with Zürich, but nonetheless, the complete group has been working on publications and congress presentations.

a.5) E-Mental Health Research. The network E-Mental Health for Depression: Latin-American experiences continues to strive, involving researchers and center from Chile, Colombia, México and Germany. During 2021 members of this network received a research grant from MIDAP (FIP) to continue research on internet-based interventions for depression. The project "Using technology to facilitate international research on diagnosis and treatment of borderline personality disorder in adolescence, including low and middle-income countries – strategy based on direct clinical benefit" continued to strive during 2021, focusing primarily on completing development of the Mental Health Information Reporting Assistant (MHIRA), an open-source software to conduct Evidence-Based Assessment (EBA). The project continues to be funded by Botnar Foundation in Switzerland, and involves researchers from Chile, Switzerland, The US, Kosovo and Tanzania. As reported last period, in 2021 a Minimum Viable Product was available for use. However, formal operation of MHIRA in participating centers was delayed to 2022 because the reporting tool capability was considered to be underdeveloped. Doctoral students within the project continue to make progress. A paper with a systematic review of short, free, and digitally available instruments to measure psychopathology in children and adolescents was submitted for publication and is currently under review in *BMC Psychiatry*.

a.6) Early Developmental Conditions. During 2018, an international research grant was awarded by CONICYT to create the Network for the Study of Emotion Regulation within the Family Context, involving researchers from Universidad del Desarrollo and MIDAP in Chile, University of California Davis in the USA, and the University of Melbourne in Australia. The aim of the network is to foster scientific exchange and develop multilateral training initiatives. During 2021, this network resumed activities that were halted due to the pandemic. An international meeting was organized at Universidad del Desarrollo and sponsored by MIDAP that involved members and centers of the network. Also in 2021, MIDAP researchers and other local members of the network visited UC-Davis for a research stay. An article entitled "An explanatory model of parental sensitivity in the mother-father-infant triad" was accepted with minor revisions in *Infant Mental Health Journal*. MIDAP's Adjunct Researcher Claudia Capella is involved in the Steering Committee of the Child, Adolescent, and Family Research Special Interest Group (CAFTR) from the Society of Psychotherapy Research. This is a recognized group within SPR and some of the members have participated in joint research activities at MIDAP, including a FIP project.

b) Other collaborative activities.

As previously reported, regarding the development of **longitudinal studies**, MIDAP has partnered with national research centers, which has resulted in a significant strengthening of Research Line 1 (details are presented in Section 3). Specifically, MIDAP has contracted with the Center for Intercultural and Indigenous Studies (CIIR) to include a mental health module in the Longitudinal Survey on Intercultural

Relationships (ELRI). MIDAP has also contracted with the Center for the Study of Social Conflict and Cohesion (COES) to include a mental health module for depression and subjective well-being in the Longitudinal Social Study of Chile (ELSOC). Finally, the Encuesta Longitudinal de Primera Infancia (ELPI) [National Longitudinal Survey of Early Childhood] has produced third-wave published in 2019. One doctoral student at MIDAP is currently analyzing these databases to explore depression heterogeneity.

During 2020 MIDAP started a collaboration with MIDE, a measurement center based at the School of Psychology of the Universidad Católica de Chile. The collaboration has yielded an International Seminar including potential additional partners to this collaboration at the University of Chicago and Harvard University. The work of this network focuses around issues of mental health measurement, including the development of computer-adaptive tests. During 2021, this collaboration led to three large scale consulting processed in the public and private sector related to measurement of mental health and well-being and the design of interventions strategies for promotion, indicated prevention and clinical management.

In addition, regarding **early developmental conditions**, MIDAP continues to have researchers participating formally in the Attachment & Adoption Research Network, which includes 12 countries in four continents. The network brings together an international group of researchers with the scientific aim of examining the development of attachment bonds in children deprived of their families. The network provides common instrumentation to advance research in this topic and aggregates findings in collaborative publications. Our Associated Researcher Dr. Pia Santelices is a formal member of the Chile team within this network. Dr. Santelices is now also Director of the Center CUIDA (Center for research in abuse and early adversity).

Under an ongoing research project, (FONDECYT Regular 1191299) a scientific collaboration with Psicomédica Clinical Group, a Santiago-based mental health treatment center continues to flourish, even though data collection for this project has been significantly hampered because of the pandemic.

MIDAP has also continues to collaborate with the International Society for the Study of Personality Disorders (ISSPD), where MIDAP's Director of Research, Dr. Alex Behn is Vice-President in charge of the Latin American Group. During 2021 it was held the annual meeting in Oslo, Norway.

MIDAP continues to collaborate with the Columbia Global Centers – Santiago (CGC). During 2021, CGC supported the realization of the III Latin-American Workshop for Research in Depression and Personality. The workshop included participation of Columbia University professor Dr. Lena Verdelli who delivered a talk and mentored participants on career advisement. Finally, during 2021, MIDAP partnered with Psiconecta.org, Metro and P. Universidad Católica to carry out a mass communication campaign to promote well-being and mental health. Metro is the subway system in Santiago, and the campaign entitled "Cuida tu salud mental (take care of your mental health)" was aired in TV screen across the complete Metro networks. Riders could scan QR codes and access information about depression, stress, emotions and suicide prevention. The campaign was rather successful and will likely be repeated in 2022.

6. Outreach and connections with other sectors (Annexes 7.1 a 7.3)

- a) Outreach:** New COVID-19 outbreaks in early 2021 made it impossible to schedule in-person activities, at least during the first months of the year. Therefore, in addition to the outreach activities carried over from the year 2019, we introduced new communication products and strengthened those advertised through MIDAP's website and social media channels, whose reach has increased considerably.

The Institute's Communications area created the program “Mental Health Updates - MIDAP’s Podcast”, which can be accessed on Spotify. One or more episodes are released each month. They are hosted by the head of the area, who holds a 40-minute interview with a researcher from the center or other relevant guests to talk about the studies and new findings associated with each of MIDAP’s lines of research, prioritizing the most news-worthy topics at the time of the interview. The first episode of “Mental Health Updates – MIDAP’s Podcast” was released on Spotify in May 2021. Entitled “Are the people of Santiago feeling overwhelmed?”, the interviewee was MIDAP associate researcher Jaime Silva. A total of 16 episodes were released in 2021. As of this writing, the podcast has over 1,600 plays. All episodes are hosted at www.midap.org as well as on Spotify and are advertised on the Institute's Instagram, Facebook, Twitter, and LinkedIn accounts.

In addition, the Communications area of MIDAP re-launched its dissemination product entitled “MIDAP Information Bulletin”, a monthly report on the latest scientific publications, news, events, courses, and other initiatives associated with the Institute. The Bulletin, which is advertised on MIDAP’s website as well as on its social media channels, is submitted via e-mail through the Mailchimp platform to over 6 thousand contacts.

The permanent dissemination of MIDAP’s achievements and findings in the mental health field, one of the four core aspects of the Institute's efforts, continued in 2021. Our main concern in this regard was to address the huge challenge of making effective contributions to mental health rehabilitation in Chile, given the emotional and physical toll of the pandemic. The productive alliance established with the online press outlet CIPER Académico –signed in 2020 and sponsored with funding from the Millennium Scientific Initiative (Milenio-ANID), through the Competitive Grant for Outreach Initiatives (PME) of that year–, remained in place until June 2021. This agreement resulted in the publication of two articles based on interviews with researchers from the center and nine columns, all of which are detailed in the Outreach Activities Annex of this Annual Report. With the same funds, MIDAP signed a collaboration agreement with Cábala Productions to make two episodes of the special series Neurópolis Pandemia. Hosted by Chilean biologist Bruno Grossi, the program covers the scientific research produced within the context of the COVID-19 pandemic. The episodes created by MIDAP were “Neurópolis during the pandemic - emotions” (30 min) and “Neurópolis during the pandemic - violence” (23 min). Both products are described in detail in the Outreach Product Annex of this Annual Report.

With the fresh funds received in October from Milenio-ANID through the 2021 Competitive Outreach Grant, which enabled us to implement activities in the second semester of that year and the first semester of 2022, we implemented the campaign “Take Care of Your Mental Health!”. To celebrate the World Psychologists' Day, this initiative was publicly launched on December 9th through the digital platforms of the Santiago Subway. The objective of this campaign –which is still ongoing– is to give Santiago Subway users some information about four specific mental health topics (depression, stress, suicide, and emotional intelligence) through educational videos. This visual material is complemented with written material on each topic as well as other MIDAP-produced videos hosted on the Psiconecta.org web platform and on the Institute's website, all of which is shared on the social media channels of both entities.

In parallel, we conducted other dissemination activities that enabled us to continue increasing our status among the general public and in the mass media as a leading institution in the mental health field. Over 40 people have died in Chile (as of late 2021) due to the COVID-19 pandemic. This prompted the executive board of MIDAP to join forces with the renowned cartoonist Guillo to create a five-minute

psychoeducational animated video (animate) entitled “Mourning during the pandemic”, which teaches people how to cope with the processes of mourning. This material was disseminated through our website and social media platforms to support the families who, apart from dealing with the loss of a loved one, were forced to adapt their farewell rituals and work through their mourning in highly adverse conditions.

In April 2021, MIDAP participated in the Puerto de Ideas Science Festival (Valparaíso), held on-line from April 12 through 18. In this event, the Institute's Head of Research, Alex Behn, gave the talk “From Freud to Zoom, Psychotherapies of the 21st Century”, which was broadcast online. In this talk, Dr. Behn sought to answer questions such as “what do psychotherapists do today?”, and “how has this therapy changed since its invention by Sigmund Freud 120 years ago?”, among others.

In October, MIDAP played an active role in the 2021 Science Festival (FECI), contributing two interviews, one talk, and one podcast. The event, organized by Explora RM Sur Poniente, was held from October 20 through 24 both in-person and on-line.

As in the previous year, the pandemic did not prevent us from offering fully on-line training programs in 2021 to make a variety of effective tools available to professionals working in health care and other areas. The programs offered in 2021 are detailed in the section Education and Capacity Building.

Concerns over the mental health issues affecting Chileans due to the pandemic sparked media interest in this topic, and since MIDAP has emerged as a permanent source of information, our researchers were frequently interviewed, with at least 65 appearances in opinion columns, radio and TV interviews, and articles on this subject (for details, see the Outreach Activities Annex).

Lastly, and even though these are not outreach activities as such, we wish to highlight that the Plenary Meetings, held four times per year and attended by all MIDAP researchers, welcomed important actors in the field of mental health public policy, including the lead researchers of the Social Longitudinal Study of Chile (COES) and the Longitudinal Study of Intercultural Relationships (ELRI). In addition, MIDAP researchers had the opportunity to report the results of mental health and COVID studies conducted under the aegis of the Institute.

It is also worth noting that, as of this writing, MIDAP has 1,792 followers on Twitter, 11,630 on Facebook, 3,976 on Instagram, and 215 on LinkedIn, with the latter social networking site being incorporated in mid-2022.

- b) Connections with other sectors:** Most of the connections established in previous years have been maintained over time, except for some that were made due to the COVID-19 health emergency that began in March 2020 (see further details in Annex 8).

Although a number of the Institute's researchers had previously participated in the development of the Ministry of Health's national health plans, in 2021, for the first time, MIDAP was formally invited as an institution to join the technical committee of experts in Mental Health for the preparation of the 2021-2030 National Health Plan. Associate Researchers Alex Behn and Claudio Martinez were designated as representatives to this committee.

Mariane Krause is still collaborating as a member of the Advisory Council of the new Ministry of Science, Technology, Knowledge, and Innovation. This year, Pía Santelices stayed on as a member of Explora's Advisory Board until it merged with the Public Science Program, born with the purpose of promoting the socialization of knowledge –outside the school environment– through the articulation of actors and institutions, the development of memorable experiences, and work with communities under the aegis of the Science and Society Division of the Ministry of Science, Technology, Knowledge, and Innovation. At that point, Explora's Advisory Council was dissolved. Pía Santelices is still leading the collaboration agreements with the Child Welfare Program of the Universidad Católica del Maule and the School of Psychology of the Universidad Católica del Norte (UCN).

MIDAP's collaboration with several research centers that are conducting longitudinal studies based on the results of the Longitudinal Social Study of Chile (ELSOC) and the Longitudinal Study of Intercultural Relationships (ELRI) (especially COES and CIIR), have also resulted in scientific and general interest articles in multiple media outlets. Indeed, in 2021, MIDAP's first General Meeting was entitled "The ELSOC and ELRI longitudinal surveys: main results and opportunities for mental health research". MIDAP researchers were able to hear about preliminary results and opportunities for collaborative work with COES, represented by Roberto González and Matías Bargsted, Principal Investigator and Associate Researcher, respectively, and CIIR, represented by Eduardo Valenzuela, Principal Investigator. In addition, MIDAP researchers and students have participated in a variety of training sessions on quantitative data analysis that are regularly offered by COES.

Within the framework of the collaboration with the MIDE UC Measurement Center, established in 2020, MIDAP, through the research team headed by Alex Behn, has conducted a series of institutional consultancies focused on measuring levels of well-being and mental health and designing promotion, indicated prevention, and clinical management interventions.

Associate Researcher Luis Salazar has continued to collaborate internally with UFRO, serving on various committees, such as UFRO's Committee of Graduate Affairs and Medical Specializations and the Continuous Quality Improvement Team, Doctoral Program in Sciences (specialization in Applied Cellular and Molecular Biology). At the national level, he continues to be part of the Fondecyt G2-G3 Medicine panel and as a member of the Advisory Board on the Accreditation of Graduate Programs for the National Accreditation Commission.

Marcia Olhaberry, deputy director of MIDAP, continues to serve as a member of the board of directors of the Integra Foundation. In this position, she contributes along with other colleagues with the knowledge generated from their research. Her participation constitutes a great opportunity to contribute to bridging the gap between scientific knowledge generated in academia and early childhood public policies. Throughout 2021, Dr. Olhaberry collaborated with the Ministry of Health in the systematic review and feasibility analysis of assessment instruments for children's mental health.

With the gradual return to classrooms, young people's mental health has gained relevance during the pandemic. In this context, MIDAP's Young Researcher Álvaro Jiménez was invited to join the technical group tasked with developing the Guide for the Promotion and Prevention of Mental Health in Higher Education Students.

Associate Researcher Susana Morales participated in a technical consultancy for the implementation of the Master's Degree in Clinical Psychology at the Universidad de Concepción. In addition, as in previous years, she was invited to collaborate in the preparation of the 2021 "Regional Report: Suicide Mortality in the Americas" of the Pan American Health Organization (PAHO/WHO). Also, at the international level, Young Researcher Cristian Montenegro collaborated with WHO on the preparation of the 2021 World Mental Health Report.

c) **Other achievements:** Nothing to report during 2021.

7. Administration and Financial Status

- a) **Organization and administration:** Due to the persistence of the COVID health emergency, all the administrative tasks and internal meetings of the MIDAP Institute continued to be held remotely throughout 2021. The Council of Associate and Senior Researchers¹ holds its monthly meetings on Zoom. As is already known, the tasks of the Council include organizing and coordinating all the scientific-academic activities of the Institute; actively participating in a variety of research activities held each year; making decisions about the promotion of researchers belonging to the Institute; defining the rules of some internal tenders and selecting their beneficiaries; and making strategic decisions about the research conducted at the institute, among other tasks.

MIDAP's Management Team, which executes the decisions of its leaders and Council (see previous Annual Reports) underwent a new change in early 2021. Given the sustained increase in the activities of MIDAP's communications and outreach areas, we decided to split the position of Communications and Outreach Manager. Thus, since March 2021, Paula Zañartu continued to work as our Outreach Manager, while Carolina Cares joined MIDAP as Communications Manager.

The various studies led by a MIDAP researcher have a team composed of other researchers and research assistants, some of whom receive payment through MSI funds for part-time staff. The other research assistants are supported through external funds provided through additional research projects led by MIDAP researchers.

- b) **Financial Status** (Annex 9): The Institute received the total payment of its eighth financial contribution from the MSI by early July 2021 (approx. US\$378,000), the same amount in Chilean pesos as the previous year, but equivalent to a 9% smaller dollar amount relative to 2020. Additionally, the MSI contributed with US\$ 16,800 for Outreach activities, a 18% budget increase compared with the funding allocated in 2020.

MIDAP continues to receive some financial support from ANID (approximately US\$20,900), allocated through FONDECYT for two research projects conducted by MIDAP researchers, together with other grants obtained from various sources, like the funds awarded by Botnar Foundation (Switzerland). In 2021, we received another grant of CLP\$10.000.000 (approx. US\$14,380) from the Vice-President's Office for Research of Pontificia Universidad Católica de Chile to support the training of postdoctoral researchers (more details in section 4). In addition, we received a payment of US\$ 20,500 for a scientific consultancy to Banco Santander, and received an additional US\$63,400 from the training programs offered annually by MIDAP.

The outflow structure for the year 2021 followed the same pattern of past years, with most of the MSI income being spent on researchers' and students' salaries and bonuses, internal research grants, research assistants' salaries, partial support for publications, and small contributions for attending scientific events, among other elements.
